"Two Servants" Richard Haney

I had occasion to attend two memorial services last month. One was for my father, Glenn Haney, on March 17. Pam and I drove back to Richmond from Pennsylvania on March 19. Then on March 20 I attended another service for Bob Wendell of St Giles Presbyterian Church. I cannot help but think jointly about these two men I admired.

Of course I knew my dad much better than I knew Bob. My dad was 82, devoted to his family and served many years as a Presbyterian elder. Bob was 92, devoted to his family and served many years as a Presbyterian elder. I met Bob in 1982 when we both served on Hanover Presbytery's Evangelism Committee. 21 years later Bob and I saw each other again when I became interim minister of his church.

My dad was remembered with the Bible passage, "Well done good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of your Master." It was part of his obituary, quoted by the preacher in his service and mentioned by a friend. I'm fairly certain all three of us referenced that verse independently in reference to my dad.

Bob was remembered by a long bible passage—the first chapter of Ephesians. He asked someone to read it to him every day the last month of his life. Here is verse 18, "I pray also that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints…"

Both texts bid us look ahead to a rest, a joy, a hope and a future that God has prepared for his people. That is one of our privileges and responsibilities at memorial services—to envision what God has in store for us by bearing witness to the resurrection hope we have in Christ. Bob and Glenn lived in that hope and have entered that place of peace and rest.

One more point of comparison strikes me about these two Christian gentlemen. Each one reached out to others as caring servants. Bob served in many capacities in his church. He especially loved singing in the choir and playing the upright bass. My dad did likewise; he enjoyed serving his church and presbytery and also sang in many choirs. Perhaps the opportunity to sing in choirs and worship services tunes the soul. Both Bob and Glenn were gentle and kind. They will be missed but they will be remembered!

Fifty Days of Joy

Easter is a festival **season of** *fifty* **days** whose first day is Easter Day, the Sunday of the Resurrection, -this year on April 8- and whose last



day is the Day of Pentecost. Easter is such a huge mystery and celebration that we can't keep it in just one day. The time to get ready to enter the mystery of Easter, Lent, is greater

than the time to get ready to enter the mystery of Christmas, Advent. Easter is an even *greater* mystery and celebration than Christmas! The **fortieth day** of Easter is **Ascension Day**, this year on May 17 - always on a Thursday and, consequently, easily forgotten! (Read about the event of Christ's Ascension: Acts 1:6-11.) The word *Easter* comes from *Eostre*, a Teutonic goddess whose name is associated with springtime, growth, and fertility. In most languages the name of the day is *Pascha*, which means "Passover".

The color of this time of the Church Year is, as is Easter Day, white for purity, joy, and celebration. We remember this time especially with the empty cross, a sign of the victory of Easter.

Remember that each and every Sunday throughout the year is a "little Easter", reminding us as Christians of the resurrection, since it was on the first day of the week that Jesus rose from the dead. During this, Eastertide, help your family continue the great celebration by lighting a candle at your evening meals and saying a prayer of thankful joy! It is also appropriate to have mini egg hunts throughout this time. Make the most of those plastic eggs! Remember that the eggs, chicks, bunnies and butterflies are symbols of new life and reminders of the resurrection of Christ and new life in each of us. Happy Easter!

From Stewardship & Finance Division

Richmond native, Chuck Goodykoontz of Rochester, NY has given Tuckahoe Church \$10,000 as seed money for a scholarship fund to honor the late Ned Warinner, Shirley Warinner and Susan Warinner Hogg. Chuck's father, Alf Goodykoontz, was killed in the October, 2003 auto crash outside Carlisle, PA. that also took the life of his best friend, Ned Warinner. Ned, Shirley and Susan were all deeply involved for many years in the life of our church.

It is the intention of the Stewardship & Finance Division and the Endowment Committee to utilize the fund in the future to award higher education scholarships to young people who are Tuckahoe members and are on track to graduate from high school. Upon approval of Session, the Warinner Family Memorial Scholarship will be segregated from the other funds in the Endowment.

When the scholarship fund has grown sufficiently, youth members of our church who are college-bound will be encouraged to make application for scholarship assistance. The procedure to determine how the grants will be awarded will be determined in the near future. Stewardship & Finance would like to do a Moment for Mission on the scholarship sometime before our Youth Sunday service.

Chuck Goodykoontz said that his home church, Gates Presbyterian in Rochester, began a scholarship fund with an individual gift of \$10,000 in 1997. Since then, the church's scholarship fund has received 231 gifts totaling \$98,755. The church began utilizing the fund in 2001 and began giving college grants of \$1,000 in 2004. In 2005, Gates Church provided its first four-year grant, renewable annually.

Tuckahoe members who want to contribute to the scholarship fund are asked to note "Warinner Scholarship Fund" in the memo line of their checks.

2011 Report of the Endowment Governing Board

During 2011, the Endowment Governing Board (the Board) consisted of Beth Ayers, Tim Beane (Moderator), Al Honkala, Ruth Anna Langdon, Amanda Wallace and Lucky Wroniewicz. Tim and Lucky began their second three year terms on the Board in January. The Board met five times in 2011—3/2, 4/6, 6/1, 9/7, and 12/7. A quorum was present for each meeting. All Board members actively participated and performed their duties in accordance with the guidelines set forth in the Endowment Fund Plan.

Three year terms of service by Beth Ayers (her first) and Ruth Anna Langdon (her second) were completed in December. Beth has agreed to serve an additional three year term. Linda Ramsey has agreed to serve on the Board for the 2012-2014 term. The Board would to thank Ruth Anna for her numerous contributions during her terms of service.

The Plan provides for eight endowment sub-funds, four of which presently are funded. A total of \$8,292 was deposited into these funds during 2011. Dividends totaled \$11,974 and net market loss was \$8,592. The Board received three requests for funds in 2011. A total of \$6,418 was approved to 1) provide partial support for Tuckahoe's summer mission trip (\$5,000), 2) to provide partial support for the fall Family retreat (\$668) and 3) to support the POJ Youth Council's Stop Hunger Now project (\$750). Taking contributions, timing of withdrawals and fund performance into account, the 2011 beginning and ending balances in the funds are as follows.

Additional activities undertaken by the Board included ongoing upkeep of the Heritage Garden and periodic communications in the Torch newsletter. Nine bricks and a new plaque were installed in the Heritage Garden in 2011. The Board sponsored a Wednesday Night Supper in May where materials relating to Endowment were provided and Ginny Purcell from Westminster Canterbury spoke.

Introducing Taizé

On July 24, five TPC students and two adults will find their way to a little village in the Burgundy countryside, where they will spend a week praying, studying, and working alongside the Brothers of Taizé, an ecumenical monastic community in the heart of France. Taizé has become a pilgrimage site for tens of thousands of people each year, but their particular mission is to the young (ages 16-29).

Taizé was an ordinary and rather isolated village when a young Swiss Reformed pastor, who would later be known simply as Brother Roger began to formulate his vision for a Christ-centered community of reconciliation at the beginning of the Second World War. He spent his first two years in relative solitude, harboring refugees, mainly Jews who had fled from Germany and Poland. Shortly thereafter a few other young men joined him and committed themselves to the traditional monastic vows of poverty, celibacy, and to a communal life of prayer.

A day at Taizé is ordered by three prayer services which take place each morning, midday and evening in the Church of Reconciliation. Taizé is perhaps most well known by its meditative songs composed by the brothers. In addition to the prayers, Pilgrims will spend time in Bible reflection with young people from all over the world and will have a chance to join with the brothers in the daily work and upkeep of the community. These latter two are tremendously important because there are no paid staff at Taizé and the brothers only ask that pilgrims who come to visit pay enough to cover the cost of their food and come with a willingness to lend a hand where it is needed. At night we'll sleep in a tent community with other pilgrims.

. My hope is that this experience will be for our students one of simplicity, personal prayer, rest, and renewal, punctuated by walks through the countryside and joyous conversation with new friends. If our time at Taizé is successful, I envision incorporating a pilgrimage to Taizé once every four years so that each student (rising Sophomore – rising College Freshman) will have the opportunity to attend once during his or her time as a student at TPC. Please be in prayer for our students as they prepare for this journey.

Summary of February Session Meeting

Following Clerk Bauer's customary review of communications received by the Church, which are committed to record, the Session opened its February meeting with a report from Elder Tim Beane regarding the status of the TPC Endowment Funds. Three requests for funds were made and approved in 2011. The Endowment Committee will be working on amendments to the governing by-laws pursuant to requirements laid-out in the current by-laws governing the funds.

Pastor Haney provided a brief summary of his activities, including pastoral care and membership items. He also noted his current involvement in the teaching of a Mission History class and plans to return to Oxford, England after Easter to continue his studies. Pastor Good provided updates on his Youth Ministry, including the 15 High School students that participated in the winter retreat and the upcoming youth fundraiser. He also reported on his pastoral care and confirmation class activities.

Deacon Kathy Bauer reported that the Diaconate successfully transitioned to a care share grouping based on zip codes/geography. Session was asked to comment on and approve continued use of TPC facilities by SPARC for their summer camp. A brief discussion concluded with a request that SPARC be presented with a clear list of expectations (including staff needs). Pursuant to acceptance of same, SPARC received Session blessing for continued lease of our facilities (SPARC lease resources are a component of TPC's annual budget). The Administration and Personnel Division offered and received approval for a new 2012 year Interim Pastor Covenant for/with Rev. Haney. A congregational meeting was also scheduled to offer for approval Associate Pastor Good's 2012 call and to hear a report from the Nominating Committee to elect Amy Glass to fill a vacant deacon position/term.

Finally, Nancy Millsaps provided a report of the Executive Council meeting held in February. The Executive Council suggested, and Session approved, a review of and, as needed, revisions to the current policy manuals of the various Divisions and Committees of TPC. Such review will incorporate the findings and directives of the visioning/discernment process undertaken in 2010-2011. The Executive Council will continue to meet on an as needed basis at the discretion of the Head-of-Staff.

The meeting was closed with a review of prayer needs and with prayer. Please continue to consider and encourage TPC's Elders and Deacons in your communications and prayers as we move forward in light of our new vision statement and the needs of our church and community. Members are encouraged to seek out Church officers for discussion if any questions or concerns arise.
