HELPS FOR PRAYING

Recently I had a discussion with Sarah Pugh and Mark Cain following our weekly staff meeting. We were talking about the prayers in the worship service. We discussed the advantages and disadvantages of scripted or set prayers versus free or spontaneous prayers. In particular we were thinking and talking about The Pastoral Prayer. This prayer, of course, is ordinarily the longest prayer in the worship service. It is part "praise and thanksgiving" and it is part "intercession and supplication." The other regular prayers in our Sunday service are "the prayer of confession" before the assurance of pardon and "the prayer of dedication" that follows the offering.

Years ago, I discovered the sermons of the Scottish preacher and New Testament teacher, James S. Stewart. Stewart, a minister of the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh, was considered one of the finest preachers of the 20th century (he died in 1990). My first ministerial colleague, Alan Meenan, had done graduate studies in Edinburgh and heard Stewart preach there regularly. He raved about Stewart's sermons and told me one day that Stewart also wrote out his Sunday morning prayers, word-for-word. I had learned in my college days to pray out loud spontaneously and I think I harbored a mild mistrust of manuscript prayers. But I held Stewart in great esteem and found his written prayers as inspiring as his sermons.


FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

Years later, as I studied the Psalms, it dawned on me that these were "manuscript prayers" as well. Someone prayed the psalms and had sense to write them down. David and Asaph and the Sons of Korah wrote or composed these hymns/prayers for both devotional and liturgical uses. The Israelites and later the Church preserved them and by faith we count them as part of scripture—God's inspired and authoritative word. The psalms are Hebrew words spoken to God that now serve us as God's word to us.


The psalms have a lot to say to us as both inspiration and instruction. Among other things they remind me that "set prayers" have a long and noble history. Someone else's prayer uttered at another place and time may help us when our words fail and our voice falters. The apostle Paul famously gave us a description of how the Spirit helps us when we are weak and cannot find the right words to pray.

"In the same way the spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express" (Romans 8:26). Thank God for the Spirit who helps us to pray and intercedes for us. And thank God for the psalms (and other prayers) which provide a time-tested vocabulary for prayer and praise, confession, intercession and supplication.

WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?

Children's Sunday School "Backpacks for Lent" Project Reminds Us

Imagine that you have to leave your house suddenly, so suddenly that you cannot take anything with you. Now imagine that you are a child. What would you need if you had to stay away from your home for days, or longer?

That is the question we ask children in Sunday School as we begin our Lenten service project, "Backpacks for Lent". Each class brings items to fill one backpack for a boy or a girl their age. The backpacks are donated to Interfaith Services of Henrico County at Henrico County Social Services. In turn, ISH gives the backpacks to children, or a parent and children, in critical situations in addition to helping them find overnight lodging or emergency placements for their safety and protection. This project assists children who are abandoned, homeless, abused, or neglected.

This is a hands-on project that is very "close to home". The children who receive the backpacks might very well be someone you walk by at the mall, stand behind in a grocery store line, or see in a car driving beside yours. Taking this on as a Lenten devotion certainly helps our neighbor in a way that will help them to be more comfortable in what is a frightening and unknown situation as we hold them all in prayer. We don't know their names, but God does.

40 DAYS; 40 NIGHTS LENT THROUGH THE EYES OF A CHILD

- * a time for looking at things we have done that are wrong, asking God's and other people's forgiveness;
- * a time for giving up things that keep us from being loving people;
- * a time for doing extra things that will help us grow closer to God;
- * a time to be more aware of what it means to love as God loves us;
- * a time to ask God to help us be more loving, remembering that God is always ready to strengthen us;
- * a time to think about our baptism and what it means to be a child of God.

Cakes and making Lenten resolves. The mood quickly changes as we enter and become immersed in the time of Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday, this year on February 13. We focus on our journey with Jesus through the wilderness, his ministry, his last entrance into Jerusalem and the ending that was a beginning. The making of pretzels is special in a prayerful and simple Lenten way, and the *Godly Play* lesson and work of *The Faces of the Journey* seriously leads us to the huge Mystery that turns us inside out and upside down.

BY POPULAR DEMAND.... RECIPES FROM COOKING TEAM # 1

GREEN BEAN AND MUSHROOMS MEDLEY

1/2 lb. fresh green beans

2 carrots, cut into thick strips

1/4 c. butter

1 onion, sliced

1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. seasoned salt

1/4 tsp. garlic salt

1/4 tsp. white pepper

- 1. Place green beans and carrots in 1" boiling water. Cover and cook until tender but still firm. Drain.
- 1. Melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Saute onions and mushrooms until almost tender. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 3 minutes. Stir in green beans, carrots, salt, seasoned salt, garlic salt and white pepper. Cover and cook for 5 minutes over medium heat.

(6 SERVINGS)

CHESS CAKE

1 box yellow cake mix

2 sticks margarine, melted

1 egg, beaten

Mix with fork and press by hand into greased and floured 9 x 13" pan or dish.

1 box confectioners' sugar

1 (8 oz.) pkg cream cheese (room temp.)

2 eggs, beaten

2 TBS. cocoa

Mix and pour on top of first layer.

Bake at 350° for 30-40 minutes.

WILD RICE CHICKEN SUPREME

1 (6 oz.) pkg.. Uncle Ben's long grain & wild rice, original recipe

1/4 c. margarine

1/3 c. chopped onion

1/3 c. flour

1 tsp. salt

Dash pepper

1 c. half & half

1 c. chicken broth

2 c. cubed cooked chicken

1 (4 oz.) jar diced pimento

1/3 c. chopped fresh parsley

1/4 c. chopped slivered almonds

- 1. Cook contents of rice and seasonings according to package directions.
- 2. While rice is cooking, melt margarine in a large saucepan. Add onion and cook over low heat until tender.
- 3. Stir in flour, slat and pepper.
- 4. Gradually stir in half and half and chicken broth.
- 5. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in chicken, pimento, parsley, almonds and cooked rice.
- 6. Pour into a greased 2 qt. casserole. Bake, uncovered at 400° for 30 minutes.

A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER

In my role as church treasurer, I would like to lead the membership of Tuckahoe in loud applause for our congregation's response to the letter sent to us in early December by the Stewardship/Finance Division of Session. We learned in that letter that our expenses were approximately \$17,500 greater than our income. This situation did not stem from overspending; expenses had not exceeded the budgeted amount. What a difference one month can make! In December, our congregation provided gifts of almost \$80,000 toward the 2012 budget.

As a result, we ended the year with a surplus of approximately \$12,000. By the time you have read this note, Session will have determined how this surplus will be used.

As treasurer, I must be aware of our financial status on a weekly basis. On November 30, I was concerned that the church might end the year with a sizeable deficit. While we have a reserve fund to address such a result, we prefer to use that money to bolster our mission rather than to cover a deficit. On December 31, I was overwhelmed with the response of my church family.

Thank you for all that you are doing for Tuckahoe.


