I do rejoice that this opportunity is a chance for Steven to grow in his ministry capacity. Serving in California also enables him to get nearer to family and his roots. We must let our sadness be tempered by appreciating that this is an opportunity for Steven and Jill to hear and heed God's call upon their lives. And we must let our sense of thanksgiving for sharing this time with Steven and his family outrun our sense of loss.

I know you will join me in supporting Steven and Jill and Graham and MacKenzie with our prayers. They have lots of transition tasks ahead of them and we can support them and encourage them as we are able. Sometime this month we will hold a proper goodbye event to show them our love and appreciation.

God graciously called Steven to serve among us for five years. Now we wait upon God to send us new servants to lead and serve the Tuckahoe family. God is gracious and God is faithful. Let us trust Him today and tomorrow. To God be the glory. Especially during the dog days of summer.

FROM STEVEN GOOD

Curiosity. That was my first response when Jill and I began to feel that our time at Tuckahoe was coming to a close. Where would God lead us? When would we be called away? By now you have heard me talk about it during worship, received the congregational letter, read it on the web site or heard it from a friend.

Surprise. That was the feeling when it seemed like going back to California was becoming a possibility, and when the call came to join the pastoral staff of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church (particularly after a catastrophic first interview).

Grief. Jill and I shed tears when we realized that we'd be leaving the place our children were born; the place where we've built a home, formed wonderful friendships, and been welcomed as family.

As the days have unfolded, a new word has been appearing with increasing frequency: transition. For Tuckahoe, for our family, for friendships, for me. There are a hundreds of details to attend to and decisions to make.

I've experienced a number of transitions in my life. The most significant took place in my 17th year, when I encountered God within the strange world of the bible, surrounded by the beauty and mystery of the Bitterroot Valley in Montana. I discovered in St. Matthew's gospel a Lord who challenged the conventions of the religious and who revealed the unfailing love of a God who so desperately wanted to be in relationship with us that he took on the limitations of flesh and blood. That summer, that encounter completely reoriented my life.

I transitioned from being single to being married, from teaching to being taught in seminary, from seminary to pastoral ministry, and from having no children to suddenly becoming a father. All of these transitions contained elements of fear, uncertainty, challenge, excitement, frustration, and deep joy. Throughout each I have noticed a couple of trends.

First - God will provide. Jill and I have leaped into a few situations where we knew scarcely a soul. God has provided us with a community: friends, a family (frequent stand in grandparents for Graham and MacKenzie) and wonderful colleagues. The Christian Education pioneer, Henrietta Mears was once asked what she'd do differently if she could live parts of her life over again. She responded with a simple: "Trust God more."

Second - every transition has presented rich opportunities for growth. I've learned a tremendous amount from my time at TPC and, along with our dedicated youth advisors, have helped to bring a new emphasis to Tuckahoe's ministry with young people. There are a lot of unknowns in every pastoral transition, but I am excited about the dedicated youth leaders at TPC - I've always thought that they are our greatest asset.

So we'll transition together. Tuckahoe will continue to lead mission trips, youth retreats, hear God's word proclaimed in scripture, sermon, and song, and seek to share the unfathomable love of God with a weary world. This is a community called by God to be the heart, voice, hands and feet of Christ where the Spirit leads. Some things never change, even in transition.

ELEVATOR PROJECT UPDATE

The Building Committee hopes to install an elevator in the shaft that currently exists. This is the final item on the list of projects to be addressed with funds derived from the 2008-2011 capital campaign. As of the end of May, the committee had \$33,375 available from a combination of capital campaign funds and the elevator fund. Since June 1 through July 9, members of our congregation have provided gifts for this project in the amount of \$7,255. Our immediate goal is to raise an additional \$20,370 by September 15. If we meet this goal, then we will receive a challenge gift of \$25,000 from our Endowment Fund provided by our Session. The total cost of the installation of the elevator is \$86,000.

If you have not considered providing a gift to the Elevator Project, the Building Committee hopes you will do so. While you may not have a need for an elevator at this point in your life, others in our church family do. We hope to provide access to all areas of church buildings for everyone.

TYLER HARRIS COMPETES IN OLYMPIC TRIALS



Tyler Harris, 23 year old son of Chip and Bev Harris, has just completed a life-long goal of competing to make the 2012 Olympic Team. Although falling short of that goal, Tyler competed for a slot on the 2012 US Swim Team against super-stars Michael Phelps and Brain Lochte. Following is a synopsis of Tyler's stellar career

as a competitive swimmer from The Steward School in Richmond to a scholarship swimmer at the University of North Carolina to the U S National Team.

Congratulations Tyler, Bev and Chip on your tremendous commitment and dedication to your goal and the sport of swimming!

The University of North Carolina is traditionally known more for its hoops than pools, but that didn't stop Tyler Harris from coming on board. "The program is definitely on the rise since I have been at UNC," said Harris, who started swimming as an 8-year-old for his local summer league team. "It's an exciting time, and I have no doubt Rich (Coach Rich DeSelm) will have the team at the top of the ACC within the next few years. UNC offers so much to all of its athletes. I truly appreciated how the program allowed for an excellent balance of athletics, academics and life outside of those two areas. More than anything, I am proud of graduating with a degree from UNC. It's a challenging academic atmosphere but well worth the work."

After graduating in 2011, Tyler, a journalism and mass communication major, moved to Los Angeles, to train with the Trojan Swim Club while searching for a job in sports or entertainment media. Harris said it's important that he seek out opportunities in swimming and work now to give himself the best shot at living his dream: having a career in media and a fighting chance at a future Olympic team berth.

In Omaha, NE Tyler placed sixth in the men's 200-meter individual medley at the U.S. Swimming Olympic Trials finals Saturday evening. After finishing eighth in Friday's semifinals to qualify for finals, Harris moved up two spots to take sixth in a

personal-best time of 2:00.73, which bettered Harris' own UNC long-course record in the event. This was the ninth top-20 finish for the current and former Tar Heel competing at the meet.

"Tyler had a great swim tonight in an exciting 200-individual medley final at the Olympic Trials," head coach Rich DeSelm said. "He finished the Trials with a lifetime best time, and we are certainly proud of Tyler for making two championship finals at the Olympic Trials. Release: 06/30/2012


DISCOVERY CLASS (ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS)


