#### THANK-FULL HEARTS

#### **PSALM 100**

A Psalm of Thanksgiving.

Make a joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth.

Worship the LORD with gladness;
come into his presence with singing.

Know that the LORD is God.

It is he that made us, and we are his;
we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

Enter his gates with thanksgiving,
and his courts with praise.

Give thanks to him, bless his name.

For the LORD is good;
his steadfast love endures forever,
and his faithfulness to all generations.

I love this Psalm because it has a unique way of lifting me up just by reading it. In worship it usually takes the form of a call to worship, "Worship the LORD with gladness; come into his presence with singing." Often, I have thought of this as a state of gladness that we "warm up" as we call ourselves to worship and sing our opening hymn.

And yet, I am struck by the later verse that reads, "Enter his gates *with* thanksgiving..." That one little word "with" imparts the truth that "thanksgiving" is a state of the heart we bring to worship, it is not just produced in anticipation of or as we worship. If we think of it another way,

we come giving thanks out of hearts that are already thankfull. And this presupposes we are thank-full because of the over abundance of love and goodness our God shows us every day, over our entire lives, poetically stroked in the final verse, "For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations."

Our nation sets aside a day of Thanksgiving, which often involves a lavish culinary display symbolizing our material blessings. The next day (or, in some cases, the same day) we transition to a season focused on what we want, not what we have. We flood stores overspending on gifts that we hope will generate in others a sense of gladness. We pause; ever so briefly, to give thanks, and then we hurry off with thank "half-full" hearts, to elicit happiness through items of novelty.



#### FROM THE DESK OF PATRICK DENNIS

The net effect is more heart space taken up with reasons we are not thankful—what we lack, what we want, what we hope will bring us or others happiness. Consider some of the antonyms for thankful; "unappreciative, ungrateful, self-centered." We fail to see the abundance of blessings we have because we focus more on what we don't have rather than what we do have.

How about this month instead of first making Christmas lists we make "Thanksgiving" lists of all we are thankful for. In our house we have a sign that reads, "There is always, always, always something to be thankful for" and how true that is, even in the most troubling times! As Christians, our thanksgiving is not a verb with no object, we are thankful *to God*. God made us and everything we are and everything we have is because of God. Our lives are made thank-full every day by the abundant grace of Jesus Christ.

I suspect that we all would live more joyfully in these next two months and throughout the year if we kept "Thanksgiving" lists and shared them with our families, fellow members, and our neighbors. This might even cause outsiders to wonder why we seem so "thank-full" and they may want to hear more about how to be "thank-full" too.


#### THE NEW "CHURCH YEAR" BEGINS

Through two millennia of Christian worship, a certain cycle of festivals and seasons has emerged and is now observed throughout the ecumenical church. God's work of redemption in Jesus Christ offers the Church a central pattern for ordering worship in relationship to significant occasions in the life of Jesus and of the people of God. The Church thus has come to observe the following days and seasons at the beginning of the church year:

- **Christ the King Sunday** The last Sunday of the church year celebrates the all-embracing authority of Christ as King and Lord of the cosmos. Officially called the Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King, it is celebrated on the final Sunday of Ordinary Time, the Sunday before Advent. This year, November 23rd.
- Advent The beginning of the new church year is a season to recollect the hope of the coming of Christ and look forward to the Lord's coming again. Advent is celebrated over the four Sundays before Christmas. Sunday's this year are November 30th, December 7th, 14th and 21st.
- Christmas The celebration of the birth of Christ on December 25th..
- **Epiphany** The day for commemorating God's self-manifestation to all people. Epiphany will be celebrated on January 6, 2015.

#### OAK GROVE-BELLMEADE LITERACY PROGRAM

Oak Grove – Bellemeade Elementary School (OG/B) has been accredited "with warning" for at least nine years. OG/B's latest SOL English test passing percentage was 47%. To remedy this situation, there are several new programs in place this academic year.

Please consider being a **Literacy Team member**. Four of our church members (Heather DeBolt, Kaye Keyes, Steve Kramer, and Shawna Shade) will be assisting one kindergarten student and one first grader each to become better readers through one-on-one reading for thirty minutes per child each week. The children involved are reading below grade level. **Given the number of children in this category, we need more Literacy Team members.** The clock is ticking for these children. If they are not reading on grade level by the end of the second grade, there is little chance of their catching up.

We need volunteers to **read to classrooms**. For a number of years, volunteers from our church have enjoyed reading to children on Dr. Seuss Day. This year there

"You're never too old, too wacky, too wild, to pick up a book and read with a child." will be five opportunities for our church members to participate as readers. The dates are: 12/5; 1/9; 3/2 (Dr. Seuss theme); 4/3 (Earth Day theme) and 5/1. Our readers can travel together to the school. This activity is quite rewarding! A non-profit organization, First Book, has provided \$15,000 worth of new books to be given to OG/B students. There is a need for volunteers to **count books and place them in bags** for

distribution to the teachers. These volunteers will meet at 10:00 a.m. at the school on the following Wednesdays: 12/3; 1/7; 2/4; 2/25; 4/1; and 4/29. Other volunteers may be needed on distribution days. What joy you will feel on assisting these children start or add to their personal libraries. #### STOP HUNGER NOW RECAP

On Saturday October 18th Tuckahoe hosted its second annual Stop Hunger Now packaging event. Tuckahoe members took on this effort with their usual zeal for hard work and generosity of spirit, time and donations. A group of over 125 eager volunteers from Tuckahoe gathered-up friends and family members and, along with youth from Three Chopt Presbyterian Church and members of Boy Scout Troop 436, came together to tackle the packaging of meals. In the span of 1½ hours our volunteers packaged 20,088 meals. These meals will be shipped and distributed to suffering communities in one of many countries all over the globe.

This was the second year Tuckahoe has partnered with Stop Hunger Now and hosted a "meal packaging" event. Stop Hunger Now is a global humanitarian aid organization founded in 1998 to fight and eliminate hunger across the globe. Nearly 70% of Stop Hunger Now meals go to support school feeding, vocational training, child development programs, as well as to orphanages and medical clinics.

Each bag produced by Stop Hunger Now volunteers includes rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables and a flavoring mix with 21 essential vitamins and minerals. Each meal costs only 29 cents to produce and has a shelf life of two years. At six servings a bag our efforts will enable 120,528 individuals to eat. Our goal was to raise \$5,022 to cover the cost of assembling and distributing these meals but because of your generosity we will be sending \$5,906 to Stop Hunger Now.

Stop Hunger Now also assembles water filtration systems for communities that do not have enough clean water to drink. Our volunteers donated over \$400 that morning to help pay for four water filtrations systems. These systems can operate for up to 10 years.

While the volunteer turnout and production numbers were outstanding, the fun and sense of accomplishment the individuals in the group felt by having participated in this project were most impressive.

Any one in attendance Saturday morning should now feel very accomplished when you hear the sound of a gong. If you were there you know what I mean.

A special thanks goes out to everyone who donated money and/or time to package, set-up, or clean-up. Each of you made it a very successful event and your efforts are very much appreciated. 
